## **Modern-Day Persecution**

Myanmar is predominantly a Buddhist country and is listed on Open Doors USA's World Watch List as one of "the top 50 countries where it's most difficult to follow Jesus." The Buddhist religion is based on doing good works and is the fourth largest religion in the world today.

In February 2021, Myanmar experienced a military coup that replaced a quasi-democratic government with complete military rule. Many years ago, Myanmar used to be called Burma and the national language is Burmese. Persecution of Christians and other religious minorities in Myanmar is also due to "Religious Nationalism." This means that in order to be a good citizen of Myanmar, you need to be Buddhist. If you are not Buddhist, you may be denied social services, fined, or (especially during the COVID pandemic) you may be denied food or medical aid by the village or local leaders.

Christians are not the only religious group to face persecution in Myanmar. In 2017, Myanmar's military began operations against a religious Muslim minority group called the Rohingya. Their villages in Myanmar were burned down and many people were killed. Because of persecution by the military and Buddhist religious groups, the Rohingya fled to Bangladesh, a country that is on the border of Myanmar. Over 1 million Rohingya are living in refugee camps in Bangladesh in very poor living conditions. This creates a unique opportunity for Christians to pray for the Rohingya and show them love by providing food aid, clean water, and bringing them the Word of God.
